Theme for the Month

Environment Conservation

Although Environment Day gets over before school reopens, it is never too late to observe it with activities and projects in your school. Here are a few projects to help you observe World Environment Day meaningfully in your school.

- Decide a route in your village for a cycle rally. Inform students who have cycles that they will cycle through the village in a group - escorted by a teacher - to create awareness about the importance of protecting the environment. Get a group of other students (who do not have cycles) to create posters and placards with messages on how to protect the environment. Get them to tie these messages to the cycles. Let the rally start from school and come back to school.
- >> Choose a spot on a busy village road which has two trees close to each other. Tell students to create slogans, placards and posters with Environment Day messages such as 'Do not waste paper.' 'Save water.' 'Save electricity' etc. Take a group of students with you to the spot. Tie a rope between the two trees. Clip all the messages and posters on the rope in such a way that they are visible to everyone who passes by.
- Divide the classes into smaller groups. Ask each group along with a teacher to do a survey of all the trees in one small part of the village. Tell them to draw maps of the streets they visit and mark the trees on them. Let them also list out trees, what kinds of trees and how many of each they see. Compile every group's work and help the children make a school report of the Trees of the Village.
- During School Assembly, announce that every class must take a pledge to conserve the environment in any one way. Give every class some time to decide their pledges and next day, ask every class to assemble and one after another, take a group pledge.

Let's Learn English

We all know that pronouns are the words that replace nouns in sentences. We use pronouns instead of repeating the same nouns in sentences. There are many kinds of pronouns and they are all used in different ways.

For example although myself is a first person pronoun, it cannot be used to introduce oneself. We cannot say, Myself Raghu. The correct form is, My name is Raghu. Or I am Raghu.

Emphatic Pronoun

>> The pronoun myself (also herself, himself, themselves, ourselves) is called an emphatic pronoun and is used when you want to emphasise something done by the person who is being talked about. For example, I did it myself. It means I did it without any one's help. She herself told me about it.

Subject Pronouns

- >> Look at all these pronouns. I am Prema. This is my friend, Shabana. She lives in Vijayawada. This book belongs to Shabana. Please give it to her.
- » I, she, he, it, we, they and you are subject pronouns. They are used to indicate people/things about whom something is said. They are the subject of the sentence.

Object Pronouns

- >> In contrast object pronouns are receivers: things are being done or said to them. Here are some examples:
- He told me a story. I gave him the bag of mangoes. The thieves tried to run away but the police arrested them. Please give the book to her.
- Me, him, her and them are object pronouns they stand for nouns/people to whom something has happened.

Recycling and Art

Things needed

- · Balloon
- Fevicol/Flour and water glue(Instructions below)
- Old newspapers
- Scissors
- · Paints and Brush

How to do

- Blow the balloon and tie it at the end.
- ii. Make a simple, thin glue from flour and water. Mix flour and water in the ratio 1:1 to make a thin mixture. Add 3 times of boilingwater and stir it until you get a glue like consistency. Simmer for about 3 minutes, then cool.
- Alternatively, you can also make a 1:1 water and Fevicol mixture and keep it ready.
- iv. Tear the old newspapers into strips and pieces. Dip each strip of paper in the glue mixture, wipe off excess, and wrap the strip around the top half of the balloon. This is the Paper Mache.
- v. Add at least 3-4 layers of the strips over it.
- vi. Let it dry overnight.
- Pop the balloon, remove the rubber from inside the bowl. Cut the edge of the bowl with scissors.
- viii. Now paint away with your own colors and patterns!

Tips: You can build globes, dolls, masks, flower vases, cartons, boxes, beads and necklaces etc. with Paper Mache.
